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Overview

- The initial collection of Core Data Metrics: 2020
 - 110 PxP institutions participated
- The second CDM collection: 2021
 - So far includes 102 institutions
- Presenting preliminary results today
 - Data still being validated
 - PDP data in progress




- The 6-year outcomes show that completion at the home institution or another institution increased by 2* percentage points for all undergraduates
 - These rates increased for all subgroups
- However, when examining gaps, the gap ...
 - increased by two percentage points between Hispanic students and white students,
 - increased by one percentage point and between African American students and white students, and
 - Increased by one percentage point Pell recipients compared to all undergraduates



➤ Retention went up for all subgroups

➤ African American student retention rate increased the most (5 points)








6-Year Outcomes by Subgroups and Year




6-Year Outcomes by Subgroups and Year


The Gap increased for Hispanic and African American students compared to white students

Conclusion

- Retention is a good indicator of early success. Based on the preliminary data, we are moving in the right direction by closing the retention gaps for students who are traditionally marginalized.
- The 6-year outcomes are for cohorts that started in Fall 2013 and Fall 2014. These are lagging indicators and will not reflect the impact of initiatives implemented for several more years. Nonetheless, with growing completion gaps for African American and Hispanic students, we still have time to invest in efforts to improve completion for those populations.
